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ALLIED ELECTIVES

Courses may count as allied electives if they do not appear on the Disability Studies electives list but nonetheless deal with disability in a significant way. Such courses should consider social, political, or cultural models of disability; examine disability as an identity; and/or foreground the experiences and perspectives of people with disabilities. For a course to count as an allied elective, students must complete a significant disability-focused project that reflects critical disability studies perspectives as learned in DISAB 3000 and/or DISAB 5880.

For a course to be approved as an allied elective for a Disability Studies minor, the course syllabus and disability-focused project must be viewed and approved by the director of Disability Studies. An option exists to rewrite the disability-focused project from a critical disability studies point of view.
